INTRODUCTORY REMARKS BY MRS. MERCY HAIZEL-ASHIA, REGISTRAR

Distinguished ladies and gentlemen joining us from all over the world, Our special graduates for this morning,

Good morning.

On behalf of management, employees, and students of the University of Ghana, I welcome you to the University's maiden virtual graduation ceremony.

The decision to hold a virtual ceremony was necessitated by the current national safety guidelines for meetings involving large numbers.

Today's congregation is dedicated to the undergraduate students of the University of Ghana School of Law, which is a composite part of the College of Humanities and the University of Ghana School of Medicine and School of Dentistry, of the College of Health Sciences.

These students are being graduated 'out of turn', so to speak, because they are required to have their certificates, to enable them continue with their professional training, which should start from August, 2020.

It is important to note that only students who registered to participate in today's graduation will be presented at this ceremony.

However, the list of the entire graduating class, can be found in the online congregation brochure. The University will later gazette the official pass list, showing the class of degree obtained by each student, in a Special University Reporter.

Graduation details for all other final year students will, therefore, be announced after the completion of the University's examinations processes.

Ladies and gentlemen, it is now my privilege and honour to call on the Chancellor of the University of Ghana, Mrs. Mary Chinery-Hesse, to deliver the formal welcome address and the declaration of purpose.

OPENING ADDRESS BY MRS. MARY CHINERY-HESSE, CHANCELLOR

Chairman and Members of the University Council, Vice-Chancellor, Pro-Vice-Chancellors, Registrar, Provosts, Deans and Directors, Guest Speaker, Members of Convocation, Staff and Students, Alumni, Graduands, Guests from all around the world, Distinguished Ladies and Gentlemen;

Good morning.

I welcome you all to this virtual ceremony. During today's ceremony, undergraduate students from the University of Ghana School of Law in the College of Humanities, and the University of Ghana Medical and Dental Schools, in the College of Health Sciences, who have satisfied the requirements for graduation, will be presented and graduated

.

Ladies and gentlemen, the Corona virus pandemic has completely changed the world as we know it. Activities such as visiting family and friends, attending social gatherings and indeed congregation ceremonies such as this one, have had to be redesigned, in order to safeguard our health and wellbeing, and curb the spread of the disease. I know that members of the graduating class would have liked to gather with their classmates, friends and family in the University's Great Hall to share this special day, but I am sure that you will all agree with me that under the circumstances, a virtual congregation ceremony is the best choice.

University Management has worked hard to ensure that you have a memorable ceremony that is as similar as possible to a face to face one, and I trust that this will be a memorable occasion for us all.

I would like to take this opportunity to place on record my immense appreciation for the steps taken by the University Management to ensure the safety of employees and students during these unprecedented times, and also the successful roll out of a system to continue academic work online. By all accounts, in spite of initial challenges, this project has been very successful. Soon, the last batch of final year students will complete their examinations, and thus bring the 2019/2020 academic year to a close. The clinical year for the Medical and Dental students will however, continue and end in November, 2020.

Ayekoo to management and students and indeed all faculty, administrators and staff involved in this endeavor.

I would also like to acknowledge the leading role played by scientists and staff of the University's Noguchi Memorial Institute for Medical Research, the West African Centre for Cell Biology of Infectious Pathogens and all other frontline workers in the University who have contributed in various ways to the management of COVID-19 in Ghana. We salute you and appreciate all your efforts, especially the successful sequencing of the genome of the virus responsible for the COVID-19 pandemic, by scientists of the University of Ghana.

As you are well aware, the University is preparing to receive the products of the first batch of the free SHS programme. The innovations thrust upon us by COVID-19 have afforded us the opportunity to explore both conventional and non-conventional ways of opening up access to higher education to these prospective students.

As the University works to complete the physical infrastructure to receive these students, we are also improving our IT infrastructure to strengthen our ability to offer a blended approach to teaching and learning.

Many of our students will be proceeding either to undertake further training in Law, Medicine and Dentistry, or to start practicing in their chosen professions.

I am sure that most of us taking part in today's ceremony have followed with interest, discussions on the calls for reforms in legal education in Ghana. In April this year, the President of the Republic was slated to open a major international conference on the future of legal education in Ghana, organized by the University of Ghana School of Law.

With participation of experts in legal education in Ghana, many other parts of Africa and from Europe and the United States, the conference was expected to result in policy and legislative proposals that would address the many challenges of legal education in our country today: from entry requirements and admission numbers; curriculum reform, teaching methodologies and examinations, to financing and long term outlook.

The conference has been postponed to next year because of the pandemic, and I am sure that we all look forward to the deliberations resulting in the much needed reforms in the training of lawyers in Ghana.

In the meantime, I charge you, our graduating law students, to pledge to do your best to uphold the spirit and the letter of the law and the ethical standards of the noble profession that you have chosen to pursue.

In the wake of COVID-19, we are witnessing many innovations in the legal sphere. E-Justice, long overdue, is picking up fast, and many more court processes are being filed electronically now. These developments point to one thing: as you prepare yourselves to enter the legal profession of the twenty-first century, you must appreciate the critical role you must play in the governance of our nation, and you must be prepared to do this in the context of the electronic and digital revolution that has only just started.

To our graduating Medical Doctors and Dental Surgeons, you are starting your profession at a time when the world is experiencing the Covid-19 pandemic and health workers are disproportionately affected. These times have re-emphasized the importance of our health care workers and the sacrifices that they make on a daily basis to ensure the health and safety of us all.

As you join your colleagues on the frontline of the fight against COVID-19 and other diseases, I wish you every success, and may you be safe in whatever professional setting that you find yourself in.

To all our graduating students, I hope that on the occasion of your graduation, you will take stock of what you have achieved and make a conscious decision to let your experiences guide you in your future endeavours. The road ahead will call for more hard work and dedication, and I wish you all the best.

You have played your part, by putting in enormous amount of hard work, and spending countless hours studying. Your efforts have certainly not been in vain, and we salute you all as you complete this journey today.

I take the opportunity to wish you the graduands, who are being presented today, the very best on this very important occasion. We share in your joy on the successful completion of your programme of study and we are very proud of you.

Ladies and gentlemen, I would also like to take this opportunity to congratulate the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Ebenezer Oduro Owusu, on his re-appointment to a second term. Professor Owusu, I salute you for your many achievements in your first term, and wish you every success in your second term, that starts in a few days, on August 1, 2020.

Now, distinguished Ladies and Gentlemen, I am delighted to declare this morning's assembly, duly constituted for the award of degrees of the University of Ghana to successful graduands.

It is customary for the Vice-Chancellor to give a report at Congregation, on developments in the University over the last academic year. I now call on the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Ebenezer Oduro Owusu, to present some highlights of the Vice-Chancellor's report.

VICE-CHANCELLOR'S ADDRESS BY PROF. EBENEZER ODURO OWUSU

Chairman and Members of the University Council, Pro Vice-Chancellors, Registrar, Provosts, Deans and Directors, Guest Speaker, Members of Convocation, Staff and Students, Alumni, Graduands, Distinguished Ladies and Gentlemen;

We welcome all our viewers to the first ever virtual Congregation ceremony for the 2019/2020 cohort of students. For this cohort, the University of Ghana is expecting to graduate a total of 14,295 students, comprising 964 students in non-degree programmes, 8,236 undergraduates, 4,668 post graduate students and 427 PhD students, with 6,807 being females and 7,488 being males.

This ceremony will graduate 133 students of the School of Law, Medicine and Dentistry; a figure comprising 88 students of the School of Law and 45 students of the School of Medicine and Dentistry. Other ceremonies will be organized to graduate the rest of the cohort of the 2019-2020 graduating class.

The State of the University

Academic Affairs of the University

Madam Chancellor, following the directive issued by the President of the Republic of Ghana on March 15, 2020, for all educational institutions in Ghana to be closed down until further notice, management rolled out the online teaching and learning programme to ensure that the Second Semester of the 2019-2020 academic year would be completed successfully. We fully activated the UG Sakai Learning Management System and arranged with Vodafone Ghana to distribute limited data to enable faculty and students work off-campus. We also collaborated with telecommunications companies

to whitelist all UG academic resources and created a help desk to provide technical support to faculty and students.

It was heartwarming to witness many innovations with faculty employing additional e-resources to complement the use of the UG Sakai Learning Management System.

On 31st May, 2020, the President announced that the final year tertiary level students could resume lectures, management met with stakeholders and decided to continue with the online teaching and learning programmes for final and continuing students, while affording final year students who so wished to return to campus to use on-campus resources the opportunity to do so.

The University successfully conducted the end-of-semester examinations from June 8, 2020 to July 3, 2020. Provision was also made to receive registered final year students who wanted to relocate to campus to use on-campus resources from June 15, 2020. Make-up lessons were arranged for final year students who could not participate in the Online Teaching and Learning programme to take their examinations by August 1, 2020. This batch of students will finish their examinations by August 30, 2020.

The online arrangement for teaching, learning and examinations was largely accepted by faculty and students. Management is grateful for the co-operation of all stakeholders. A special recognition to you students, who have braved all odds and adjusted to complete your programmes.

Accommodation

The University has for some time now, decoupled admission from accommodation, due to some financial obligations and judgement debt which have affected its capacity to undertake further investment to augment the housing stock.

To address the accommodation challenge which will be posed by the influx of the first cohort of graduates from the Free Senior High School policy, management is considering various approaches including an off-campus arrangement to identify suitable private residential facilities and recommend same for interested students.

Strategic Direction

Madam Chancellor, strategic teams which were set up in November 2016 to drive the transformational agenda of the University of Ghana, have continued to put in excellent work, thereby creating a better University.

Fundraising Strategy for the University of Ghana Endowment Fund Ladies and gentlemen, the Development/Major Donor Fundraising Unit of the Office of Institutional Advancement launched a fundraising drive dubbed '20 for 20' Fundraising Campaign in December 2019 to raise a minimum of GHC 20 million in 2020 for the University of Ghana Endowment Fund. The money would be raised from: (i) Alumni (ii) Faculty, staff and students of the University of Ghana (iii) Major Donors (iv) Foundation and (v) Corporate Entities.

Sports and Games

Ghana Universities Sports Association (GUSA) Games

The University of Ghana hosted the 26th Ghana Universities Sports Association (GUSA) Games from 3rd to 19th January, 2020. The games, which recorded the highest spectatorship in the history of the competition, saw the UG team winning 12 Gold (4 more than in 2018), 21 Silver (13 more than in 2018) and maintaining the 19 Bronze medals it had won in the 2018 Games. Congratulations to the Sports Directorate and the Local Organizing Committee for the hard work and class they demonstrated!

World Public Speaking Championship 2020

The University of Ghana Debate Society successfully defended the World Public Speaking Championship at the Assumption University in Bangkok, Thailand, in January 2020. This feat was achieved by Mr. Kwaku Apreku Agyepong, a level 300 student of the UG School of Law.

UG School of Law

Virtual Seminars on Implications of Covid-19 for Governance and Justice Distinguished ladies and gentlemen, the Covid-19 brought in its wake a wave of innovations. The University of Ghana School of Law successfully initiated a series of virtual seminars on the implications of Covid-19 on delivery of justice and governance in Ghana. This arrangement brought together highly experienced legal luminaries from academia and industry across law schools and institutions in the country to share ideas on possible and realistic ways of dispensing justice and implementing interventions in the face of the pandemic.

UG's Contribution to the National Management of COVID-19

The University of Ghana's contribution to the national response to the COVID-19 pandemic has been very impressive. The University's flagship Noguchi Memorial Institute for Medical Research (NMIMR), and the West Africa Centre for Cell Biology of Infectious Pathogens (WACCBIP) have strengthened capacity for testing systems nationwide. More so, the NMIMR has served as Ghana's biggest COVID-19 testing Centre.

Doctors of the UG Medical School as part of the Case Management Teams, are involved in the setup, operationalization, and provision of care to COVID-19 patients at National Treatment Centres and in developing treatment guidelines for COVID-19 case management.

The threat posed by the coronavirus to the public necessitated strict adherence to safety measures and interventions recommended by public health scientists at the School of Public Health (SPH), working with the national case management and contract tracing teams.

The School of Pharmacy on the other hand has developed and manufactured an alcohol-based hand sanitizer in line with WHO recommendations; the product, known as UG Sanitizer – Pharmol, has been approved and registered by the Food and Drugs Authority (FDA). The Department of Psychology and the Careers and Counselling Unit are also offering counselling services to Covid-19 patients to help them cope with stigma. Further, the University's Emergency Response Team

has joined forces with the National Contact Tracing Team to manage the response to the pandemic.

Well Wishes to Graduands

COVID-19 has taught us many lessons we are yet to fully appreciate. One that has stood out for me is to value our interdependence as a human community.

During these COVID days, the University has received many donations to support its fight of the pandemic. One such gift was from Mr. Lei Liang, an alumnus who studied BSc. Administration (2007 to 2012). He made a generous donation of 6000 face masks to the University. We also appreciate the wonderful contribution of students of the School of Public Health who serve as volunteers on the University of Ghana Emergency Response Team (UG-ERT). They engaged those operating at the campus markets through sensitization talks and creating more awareness on the use of the personal protective equipment (PPE).

To prepare for the reopening of the University Basic Schools, some other students dedicated time and effort to put together the information package to promote effective infection prevention control.

I believe you have all, in very significant ways, also been able to lend a helping hand to someone and made great personal sacrifices to protect others.

I would like to conclude with the words of Madison Alcedo: "Ambition is the path to success; persistence is the vehicle you ride in".

I, therefore, pray that your commitment to obtaining knowledge does not end with your graduation but that you will continue to seek knowledge to enable you to make significant changes in your lives and in society as a whole.

As you move on to the next stage of your lives, remember to uphold the values of the University – Respect, Commitment, Integrity, and Loyalty. You must recognize that the pandemic has had adverse effects on the economy and various sectors. Various initiatives have been rolled out to contain these effects. You must remain focused and contribute meaningfully to what is essential in your field of study. I would entreat you to make your lecturers and parents proud by demonstrating initiative and creativity in these unusual times. Your sacrifices, especially during the latter part of this academic year, are laudable and I hope these have shaped you for a better future.

I call on you, in this period of COVID-19, to continue to keep yourselves and others safe by observing the safety protocols. Always remember that, stigma makes a precarious situation worse. Do not reaffirm existing stereotypes about persons who have been infected by or recovered from the disease, but let your words spread hope. As the President of the Republic of Ghana says, "this too shall pass".
